

Border Trust connects the generosity of donors with local not-for-profit organisations, funding life-changing initiatives, now and into the future. Our areas of impact include community equity, connection + wellbeing, community leadership, climate resilient communities, and disaster recovery resilience and readiness.

Together we are building a generous, connected, and thriving community.

Border Trust was established in 2004 as a community- based charitable organisation to serve the Albury Wodonga region. Initially, the cities and shires of Albury, Alpine, Corowa, Greater Hume, Indigo, Towong and Wodonga were established as the geographic boundaries of the Foundation. Tumbarumba Shire joined Border Trust in August 2010.

With the emergence of Into our Hands Community Foundation and the growth of Tumut Foundation, Border Trust's current region of support is Albury, Federation (previously known as Corowa), Greater Hume, Indigo, Towong and Wodonga. For the purposes of specific initiatives such as our Bushfire Relief

Fund, we include Alpine and Snowy Valleys (previously Tumbarumba) LGAs on an exception basis.

We activate the power of giving for lasting impact across our region.

Our 2023-2024 Annual Report provides a snapshot of our efforts, collaborations and impact. We hope you enjoy reading the stories and recognise, as we do, the lasting legacy of our collective work.



Our next step is to engage further with community, local agencies and government to collect data and research and include this on our VitalSigns platform, so it is easily accessible.

Hume Bank has supported Border Trust since 2005 as our premiere Foundation Builder, generously providing office and meeting spaces that relieve us of a significant financial burden. Their ongoing support extends to fundraising campaigns, including the annual Back to School Program, reflecting our shared commitment to the region's wellbeing.

In support of creating a safer community and helping to end domestic and family violence, Hume Bank launched its dedicated Safer Communities Fund in June 2024. The fund will contribute financial support directly to frontline family and domestic violence service providers across the region.

Adroit Insurance and Risk have a strong connection to several Community Foundations including Border Trust, with the Albury office enthusiastic and engaged participants in almost everything we do.

Their support extends to the annual Adroit Insurance and Risk Charity Golf Day, which kicked off in 2013 and has continued year on year (with a notable COVID exception), raising more than \$100,000 in that time.



Based in New York, international philanthropic organisation Global Giving, has established a relationship with Australian community foundations that support regions affected by the 2019/2020 bushfires. Through a mix of specific purpose grants and untagged donations, Global Giving's contributions are highly valued, not only in a financial sense, but also through a shared understanding of the positive impact that communities working together can have.



Border Trust has enjoyed a longstanding relationship with Lester and Son, another significant local business who support our Foundation Builder Program.

Recognising the value of a strong and connected community, Lester and Son's annual contribution commenced in 2012 and was carried on by the new owners in 2019.

FRRR Back to School Program

The national Back to School Gift Voucher Program, facilitated by the Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal (FRRR) is delivered locally by Border Trust with the support of Hume Bank and local donors.

At the start of the 2024 school year, 582 students across our region received a \$50 Target or Kmart voucher to enable families in need to purchase necessities including footwear, stationary, toiletries, uniforms and books. In addition to this, 150 students received a \$100 JB Hi Fi voucher to help them with the costs of technology.

After 19 years of supporting students and families through the Back to School Program,

FRRR have reluctantly announced the conclusion of the national program. It will be missed.

Featured Story: Upper Murray Innovation Foundation

\$26,000 Playles Hill Labyrinth Project

After the Black Summer fires, the Playles Hill Project Group came together with the goal of revitalising the neglected space in Corryong, transforming it into a park for the entire community.

Their latest project is the creation of a labyrinth, designed as a tool for health and well-being. With a single, winding path leading to the centre, the labyrinth invites visitors to walk slowly and mindfully, offering a space for contemplation, walking meditation and stress relief.

The views from the labyrinth are stunning, creating a serene place for healing and reflection. Though its primary purpose is to promote mental wellness, it also serves as a gathering space ideal for community events.

The Upper Murray Innovation Foundation received a grant through Round 5 of the Towong Community Bushfire Disaster Relief Fund for the Playles Hill Labyrinth Project.



Towong Community Bushfire Disaster Relief Fund

Since 2021 Border Trust has administered the Towong Community Bushfire Disaster Relief Fund which was established in response to the 2019/2020 Black Summer bushfires that devastated our region.

Along with the Community Enterprise Foundation (covering the Alpine LGA) and the East Gippsland Community Foundation (covering East Gippsland), Border Trust was selected to partner with the Victorian Bushfire Appeal to support the long-term recovery of the Towong Shire.

As trustee of the Towong Community Bushfire Disaster Relief Fund, Border Trust will distribute \$2,850,945 through grant programs to support long term recovery initiatives.

Our thanks to the Victorian Bushfire Appeal for their trust in us to distribute these funds and to Bushfire Recovery Victoria (now Emergency Recovery Victoria) for providing operational capacity to administer the fund.

In 2023, the Carevan Foundation set out to address the rising issue of homelessness in our community.

With the support of the Give 500 grant, the Ruffy Swags Project was able to create swags for those who are homeless or sleeping rough and struggling to find a bed each night. These swags are crafted by inmates at the Beechworth Correctional Facility, providing both a valuable resource for the homeless and skill-building opportunities for the inmates.

It's not finding homes for people, but it's finding beds for people.


"The Ruffy Swags Project is moving along with great success. Give 500 has provided an opportunity for local community organisations, Carevan and Uniting Vic Tas, to come together in partnership, enabling us to try and relieve the stress associated with homelessness.

The program has allowed a sense of community connection while also providing the inmates a chance to learn new skills that will open more options when released.

Our homeless are being offered dignity and protection from the elements that surround their everyday struggles.

Already 90 swags have been made and 76 distributed."

Project: Drive2Connect

The Drive2Connect program is one beautiful example of a local project facilitating community connection. The program is delivered by the Albury Wodonga Volunteer Resource Bureau & Multicultural Services and funded via Kate Sleeman's Named Sub Fund. The project supports refugee women newly settled on the Border with professional driving lessons so that they can get their drivers licence, achieving both independence and connection with local schools, workplaces and community networks.

The Jindera Pioneer Museum's first-ever Lantern Walk, supported by a \$2,000 Community Grant from Border Trust, lit up the night.

The Lantern Walk, a very traditional European event, offers a unique experience that perfectly aligns with the museum's purpose and sense of community. It's a celebration of Jindera's German heritage and pioneering spirit, providing a link to the pioneering past you won't find anywhere else.

Fischer Community Leadership





Border Trust is proud to auspice the Fischer Community Leadership Committee (FCL), a community group committed to enabling grassroots leadership development within the community. The Fischer Community Leadership Program is an immersive and interactive program that offers participants essential leadership skills such as communication, decision making, effective meeting procedures, inclusion, social media for community groups, successful grant writing and community project management.

"The Fischer Community Leadership Program, named in honor of the late Tim Fischer AC, has proven to be a transformative initiative for regional communities in Greater Hume and Federation Councils.

Since its launch as a pilot in 2022, the program has effectively empowered grassroots leadership, and in 2024, it was delivered across three locations, supporting 35 graduates.

With 100% of participants reporting satisfaction, it is clear that we are successfully building individual and collective capacity within our communities. Participants have gained valuable skills and insights from local leaders while also strengthening their networks and confidence to advocate for their community.

We are grateful for the support of the New South Wales Government Stronger Country Communities Fund, Federation Council, Greater Hume Council, and Border Trust, which have made this impactful program possible."
